- 540 Eye exams, 398 eyeglasses delivered, 40 cataract surgeries
- Over 30 boxes of clothing delivered
- 297 children's items (clothing blankets, etc) made by St. John's Sewing Group.

Fortunately, our fixed expenses are minimal because we have no rent and no paid staff. We try to retain 6-months' operating expenses (approximately \$60,000) as unrestricted assets. Periodic audits of the records of our grantees help to confirm that grants were used as intended. We also have an annual internal audit to verify that JOP's policies on checks and balances have been followed. Our books are open to anyone who wants a more detailed view of our finances.

Vision Care Report

During the last year, four optical trips were staged by JOP teams. **Seventeen volunteers** from OH, KY and FL donated their time, talent, medicines and glasses to the eye care clinic at St Pius X and Sacred Heart in Montego Bay region.

The November, 2017 trip to St. Pius X included **Dr Tom Kelly** (**OH**), Paul Connor (OH), Amy Kuzma (OH), Peggy Johnson (KY), and Jeanne Stamant. The team completed 192 eye exams.

In February 2018, **Dr. Philip Baier (FL)** travelled to Bishop Burchell's rural territory in Seaford Town with Paul Curti (FL) where they saw 148 patients.





The April 2018 Cataract Surgery mission trip was led by Dr Jeffrey Zimm (Naples, FL) with Dr. Lynn Byerly, four staff from All Saints Eye Center and support from Jamaican ophthalmic assistants. They performed 40 cataract surgeries. We are grateful to **Dr Zimm and his professional contacts** in the Florida eye care community for their donations of medical supplies and equipment for this new initiative.

Education Report

This year Jamaica Outreach Program funded significant educational programs in the both the Kingston and Montego Bay regions of Jamaica. Over two hundred students were awarded scholarships to attend secondary schools. These grants partially paid for books and fees for students, who without this aid would be unable to attend these schools. In Jamaica, unlike the United States, the government does not provide for completely free secondary education. Therefore, children from poor families can be deprived of an education due to finances. Even though the cost may seem small to us, this is where JOP donors do make a difference.

The DuPont School, supported by JOP, is in the inner-city area of Kingston and serves children from the age of 3 to 12. A recent study undertaken of truant students showed that some children were not attending school because their families were unable to afford the uniforms or to buy shoes. This year JOP provided shoes and uniforms for 40 children. This assistance helped these youngsters who would otherwise be unable to attend school. Also, we were instrumental in establishing a remedial after school literacy pro-

gram for parents. This program enables and empowers parents to fully participate in their child's educational studies. Parents who struggled with reading comprehension had their self-esteem raised by this program. In the Montego Bay area of Cambridge, Jamaica we made a significant contribution to the St. Mary Basic School. This school serves children from ages 3 to 6 and prepares them for entry into primary grades. More importantly, the school, staffed by the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception imparts Christian values to these youngsters of tender years. Although the school is only in its fourth year it has been highly successful and acclaimed throughout the region.

JOP supported the operation of St Pius Skills Training Center. This school equipped young men and women with job skills to obtain employment. The instruction included computer skills, money management, communication and entrepreneurial skills. Forty-eight students attended the school last year. The graduates found employment in the food and tourist industry as well as cosmetology. JOP funded a 3-week Arts and Literacy summer camp which served 40 children at Holy Trinity High School. This camp provided the participants with an intense immersion in learning and creativity. The students, between the ages of 4 to 12, were afforded a safe environment to experience the creative arts including dance, music, visual arts as well as reading and literacy skills building. This year the camp was so successful that it was featured on a morning television program in Jamaica and newspaper articles.

In May **Dr. Eric Donaghy** and his team did cataract patient followups and other eye exams on 200 patients.

Paul Connor, JOP Board member and optical equipment professional, has been a God-send in the production of all the prescription eyeglasses resulting from our mission trips over the years. In the past fiscal year, **398 pairs of eyeglasses** were delivered to Jamaica by Paul at incredible savings to JOP. Paul also repairs and maintains the equipment in our eye clinics, and has solicited hundreds of new eyeglass frames from his contacts in the optical profession.

Medical Report

The medical clinic at St. Pius X in Kingston, Jamaica operates 3 days per week, with a part-time local physician who provides care on a deeply discounted basis. The clinic is open to all indigent patients in the poor neighborhood of St Pius, regardless of ability to pay, or church affilia-

tion. We estimate an average 87 patients visit the clinic per month, and last fiscal year there were 1,070 visits for the 12-month period. Jamaica Outreach Program supplies the clinic with medicine dispensed to patients free of charge.

The Sacred Heart clinic at remote Seaford Town in Montego Bay region saw 99 patients treated, medicines distributed and medical equipment and supplies donated.

The Good Shepherd Foundation clinic in Montego Bay received a grant as well.

Dental Clinic Report

Thanks to the generosity of our many missionaries and volunteers, this has been another great year for our mission outreach health care program.

Four missions were conducted in this fiscal year: two DENTAL MISSIONS at the St. Pius Campus in Kingston, one dental mission and one multi-discipline mission at the Sacred Heart compound in Seaford Town (Montego Bay area).

JOP was extremely blessed with the generous giving of their time and effort by 35 missionaries who participated in our missions: 14 from Florida,3 from California, 8 from South Carolina, 3 from Georgia, 2 from Tennessee and singles coming from Illinois, Colorado, Massachusetts, Delaware, and Maine.

At the <u>Kingston missions</u> held in February and April, our missionaries took care of all of the 1,900+ students at the DuPont School and at the St. Peter Claver School, treating each with a dose of fluoride varnish and performing a full dental evaluation on each student. Many were treated at the clinics for situations needing immediate attention. Those two missions also brought great results at the dental clinic, including the treatment of 225 patients, and nearly 100 surgical extractions.

At the February <u>multi-discipline mission</u> at Sacred Heart 99 patients were treated for <u>medical</u> conditions. Over 25 % of them for hypertension and many for diabet-

ic symptoms. Education and providing continuation of care are key for these patients and having a nurse (Sisters Theresila and Jhorna) in residency will be a great asset. On the **optical** side 148 patients were examined and 69 pairs of prescription eye glasses were fitted and manufactured for these patients. While we diagnosed many with Cataract and Glaucoma conditions, we have no facilities for treating those at this time in that area. Hopefully, in the future JOP will establish a program for performing those surgeries at the Hope Clinic in Montego Bay. Our **dentist** was very busy treating over 60 patients in the three day period, in addition to performing 14 fillings, she did 35 extractions.

The <u>dental only mission</u> to Seaford Town in late August was our first single discipline mission there, and proved to be a huge success. They performed 54 extractions and 14 fillings in addition to providing complete

dental cleanings for 76 patients. Dozens of other patients were treated for various conditions.

The mission compound at Seaford Town is being upgraded, thanks to so many generous donors and to the untiring efforts of Father Lukasz. Air conditioning has been installed in the clinic and in the doctors' house.

One of our dentists and great benefactor to the Seaford Town mission has paid for the installation of a third dental station at this clinic in memory of her mom who recently passed away (Mrs. Trudy Howell). That work station is up and running and was utilized at the August mission. Additionally through the generosity of a past board member and one of our dental hygienist missionaries, we were able to purchase a portable X-Ray camera..... which connects to a laptop computer.....which can be transported between both of our mission locations. That setup should be ready for our next mission.

Unfortunately, due to the retirement of our dental mission organizer, future missions are in limbo. JOP is in need of someone who can take over the organization of these missions. Full training and orientation will be provided and the function requires someone with a positive attitude, e-mail and basic computer skills and dedication to make things happen. On an average, this function requires 5-10 hours per week of dedicated work....maybe a little more in the few weeks before a scheduled mission. JOP has a list of over 500 persons (mostly dental with some optical and medical) who have expressed interest in participation in our mission program and it is a matter of organizing teams to participate.

Housing Report - SEVEN NEW HOMES FOR NEEDY JAMAICAN FAMILIES
