FOOD & GOODS

With the support of JOP, the St. Anne's Feeding Program continues to provide food hampers to the poorest of the poor in the Western Kingston. They are able to provide for 180-200 families a week, as well as serving breakfast twice a week.

In Montego Bay, JOP also supports the Love In Action Soup Kitchen, which provides hot meals and distribution of food packages.


We also had an entire eye exam lane donated by Dr. Zimm for the St. Pius X eye clinic.

VISION CARE REPORT

Dr Zimm and his family conducted an eye exam mission in February, 2023. They saw 220 patients, of which 160 received prescription eyeglasses and 60 were diagnosed as needing cataract surgery. Paul Connor's eye care team plans to visit the clinic at St. Pius in November 2023 and Dr Zimm intends to reinstate surgical procedures in Kingston by the spring of 2024.

Dr. Jeffrey Zimm is JOP's Eye Care Coordinator, he has been going to Jamaica for 19 years and is part of the JOP Advisory Board. There are many patients still waiting for eye surgery and vision care. For more information contact: Dr. Jeffrey Zimm 239-592-5511



EDUCATION REPORT

JOP schools in both supported the Archdiocese of Kingston and the Diocese of Montego Bay. After the pandemic, schools in Jamaica are slowly getting back into full However challenges have operation. presented greater financial barriers for JOP supported schools. Salaries of all teachers were increased by the government mandate.



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The cost of operating has also increased with inflation driving expenses of electricity, water, school supplies and salaries of support staff.

At the Marcus Garvey School, a JOP supported institution, no student is turned away due to a parent's inability to pay tuition. In addition, considering the correlation between nutrition and academic performance, all students are provided lunch regardless of their ability to pay.



This year JOP provided 424 high school and college students with stipends for books, transportation and other incidentals. Without this assistance many of these young people would not be able to continue their education.

In the Montego Bay Diocese, JOP sent \$34,000 to Bishop Burchell for the support of St Mary Basic School, Msgr. Wilson High School, and student grants in aid. At the DuPont School in Kingston uniforms and shoes were purchased by JOP for economically deprived students whose parents were unable to afford these necessities. Again without the shoes and uniforms these youngsters would not be allowed to attend school.

Moreover, over \$19,000 was provided to 5 parishes in Kingston for their parishioners in educational grants. It is our belief that education is necessary for Jamaican society to be transformed and our faith to spread and grow. DENTAL REPORT

Jamaica Outreach Program (JOP) - Dental has been in continuous operation since March 2012 and conducts 5-6 missions a year serving the poorest of the poor in Kingston and rural Seaford Town. From that first outreach to the present, there have been 42 completed missions, with only a few canceled due to viruses (Chikungunya in 2014 and COVID 3/2020 – 9/2022). There have been 6,761 patient visits and 8,150 procedures performed by 84 dentists, 226 auxiliaries (hygienists and assistants), and 48 team leaders/laypersons, all of whom were either new or returning missionaries.

MEDICAL REPORT

JOP provided three medical missions to Jamaica during our last year. Below is the report from our June mission.

Our medical team Dr. Joseph Vento, N.P. Ann Marie Bova and Loretta Vento returned to the Montego Bay area in June 2023 and tended to patients in 3 locations - two for the first time and with very limited facilities. The local volunteers were extremely welcoming and tireless in their efforts to make the mission successful. The team was well prepared with medications (many donated and others purchased by JOP) and diagnostic testing - urine analysis, pregnancy test, glucose test and EKGs.



The first stop was Seaford Town, where the patients were happy to see "Doctor Joe" again. There had been a storm the night before and all electricity was out until about noon. It was exceedingly hot and difficult to work without even a fan. The electricity was back on by noon, but water ran out presenting a new challenge.

The following day, it was off to St. Mary's church in Cambridge. The altar was the pharmacy. The heat was relentless and stifling. Father Peter led the team on a tour of the parish school. The children were delightful - happy, friendly, well behaved, and very fond of Father Peter.



The last stop was St. Paul's Church and Mission in the inner city. The church sits on a hill - a steep walk for elderly and ailing patients, but no one complained. That strip of land separates and has become a neutral ground for - two competing gangs. The grounds and church are lovingly maintained by Delta May Hall 84 years old and going strong. She wields her machete with great skill to clear the grounds of weeds. She has her tool kit to make small repairs. She cleans the church. She was the first person to greet the team. Patients were seen inside the small church. Luckily there was a fan inside and a toilet just outside the church, but not enough water to flush!

This year JOP donors funded 10 houses for Jamaican families who were previously living in squalor. The gratitude of the parents and children when presented with their new home was truly heartwarming.

However, the highlight of this year's housing program was the JOP initiative in the renovation of Antonio Gabriele Village. This facility was first constructed by JOP 14 years ago with funding from JOP and the Gabriele family. The facility serves as assisted living housing for economically destitute elderly Jamaicans. It provides communal living as well as proper food and medical care. Over the years the physical structure, mainly due to the local climate, fell into disrepair. The buildings had to be rehabbed with new roofs, paint and laundry facilities. Also the costs of food, electricity water, gas and other supplies dramatically increased after the pandemic. Once again JOP donors and the Gabriele family came to the rescue and provided a grant of \$43,683.

For donors wishing to provide a home for destitute Jamaican families the cost is \$9800. This price includes beds, mattresses and other furniture which are provided. Understanding that this price point is more than one donor can provide we are able to match donors with each providing \$4900.
